West Indies and Central America

Common names: English: Lucky nut, yellow oleander.

**Ecology:** A bush or small tree, it is widely planted in the tropics as an

attractive hedge or ornamental bush. It tolerates most soils but prefers sandy ones. Commonly used as a hedge in many areas of

Uganda.

**Uses:** Building poles, tool handles, shade, ornamental, soil conservation,

live fence.

**Description:** A multi-stemmed shrub or shady tree to 4 m. LEAVES: shiny,

narrow, in spirals around the stem, about 10 cm long. FLOW-ERS: yellow, white or salmon, in narrow trumpets, petals twisted in bud, to 6 cm long, the green base extending to the trumpet edge. FRUIT: fleshy, 4-angled to rounded, about 3 cm

across, stalked with a flat triangular nut inside.

**Propagation** Seedlings, cuttings.

**Seed:** No. of seeds per kg: about 300. Good germination rate of about

80%.

**treatment:** not necessary.

**storage:** seeds can be stored for up to 3 months.

**Management:** Fast growing; prune about a month before the rains to induce

flowering.

**Remarks:** Every part of the plant is extremely poisonous and it is not

touched as fodder even by goats. Take care with children.
